400 boats expected for Hyannis regatta

The Hyannis Yacht Club regatta, expanded last year in all aspects, expects to attract over 400 boats to the Lewis Bay area July 27-29, with the U.S. Naval Academy's New York 40, Avenger, skippered by Ens. John Westerbeke, topping a fleet of 100 cruising class racing machines.

Dennis Sullivan, regatta chairman, says that plans for the three-day event have just about been completed. The 42nd annual regatta falls between the Edgartown and Buzzards sailing extravaganzas affording sailing enthusiasts a three-week period of competition at the height of the summer.

Bill Lawson, off-shore chairman, expects two entries from the Massachusetts Maritime Academy. According to Capt. Greer, the academy plans to have its Swan 48, Cadets Pride on the starting line, and if she can be made ready, the Windlass will also compete.

The cruising class will compete in two classes, the Performance Handicap Racing Fleet (PHRF) and International Offshore Rule (IOR). A large fleet of one-design craft will be competing including 505s, Beetle Cats, Lasers, 420s, Widgeons, Cotuit Skiffs, Day Sailers, Cape Cod Knockabouts, J24s and 22s.

Beetle skippers will be competing in regular regatta events for the class as well as the Leo J. Telesmanick Championship. A large fleet of Lasers is assured as the regatta is a qualifier for the Laser world championship.

Post-race activities are planned each day, beginning opening day, in the regatta tent. A 10-piece steel band, Reel Steel, will be the featured attraction from 4 until 8 p.m. and during the same time period Saturday, the Oakland Road Band will perform. Sunday afternoon the highlight of the social schedule is the appearance of John Salerno's 15-piece Jazz Society, featuring the big band sounds of 30s, 40s and 50s.

In the Class A spinnaker division, top honors went to a J-22 called Catch 22, skippered by Van Thompson. He beat out Will Holden's Campaign and a Wianno Senior, Incubus, sailed by Jim Light from Bass River. Class B was the close division of the day as the trophy went to Neil Thomkinson and his crew aboard the Chinook. All 11 boats in the division finished within 10 minutes of each other.

Class C was almost the Maloney Division as Phil Maloney sailed Lustre to first place and Bill Maloney came in third in Lone Ranger. In between was Bob Rice and Bonaventure. First place in the E division went to Pete Eastman in his MFG 17, Hesperus.

The honor of corning the longest distance to race in Three Harbors has to go to Howard Johnson. He sailed his Cape Dory 27, "Tide Chaser," from Sesuit Harbor through the Cape Cod Canal enroute to

Harwich in order to make the race. If you come that far why not make an event of it? Johnson then left on Monday to go the other way, around Monomoy and Provincetown and back home to Sesuit Harbor.
